## HEAD COACH MELISSA LAMIE



Melissa Lamie enters her 14th season as Grove City College's head women's soccer coach.

Since taking over prior to the 1993 season, Lamie has directed Grove City to 132 victories, five Presidents' Athletic Conference championships and two invitations to the NCAA Division III Championship Tournament.

Under Lamie's guidance, Grove City became the first PAC women's soccer team to go 10-0 against conference opponents during the 2003 season. The Wolverines capped the year by earning their second consecutive berth in the NCAA Division III Tournament with a 16-4-1 record.

In 2004, Grove City went 14-6-2 and won the PAC's regular season title with a 9-1 record. Lamie earned the conference's Coach of the Year award following the season for her efforts. Over the past six seasons, Grove City has compiled a 49-6-3 record against conference opponents, including three undefeated seasons (2000, 2001 and 2003).

In 2000, Grove City earned its first-ever postseason berth by qualifying for the ECAC Mid-Atlantic Championship Tournament. Two years later, the Wolverines earned the program's first-ever NCAA Division III Tournament berth. Grove City also participated in the 2003 NCAA Division III Tournament.

Lamie earned her 100th career victory October 1, 2003 as Grove City secured a 2-0 win at Thiel. She owns a 132-102-15 (.560) career record.

A native of Denver, Colorado, Lamie earned a bachelor of arts degree in physical education from Calvin College in Grand Rapids, Mich. in 1992. In 1993, she completed her master of arts degree in physical education from Northern Colorado University.

Lamie will begin her first year as Grove City's head golf coach in spring 2007. She coached the women's basketball team at Grove City from 1992-2006 and is the program's all-time wins leader with 157.

She lives in Pine Township with her husband Steve, the College's head men's basketball coach, and their daughter Melia, 5.

## ASSISTANT DR. STAN KEEHLWETTER



Dr. Stan Keehlwetter enters his seventh season as the assistant women's soccer coach at Grove City.

As an assistant at Grove City, Keehlwetter has helped Grove City capture two Presidents' Athletic Conference titles and three postseason invitations.

Keehlwetter joined Grove City College on a full-time basis in 2004 as the Dean of Harbison Chapel. As Dean of Harbison Chapel, Keehlwetter works closely with student-led religious organizations on campus and also coordinates the College's Chapel program. He became

Dean of the Chapel in 1999.

Keehlwetter is also Grove City's head men's track and field coach. Under his guidance, the Wolverines have won back-to-back PAC titles in 2005 and 2006. Twenty-nine track and field athletes have qualified for the ECAC Championships in his three years as head men's track and field coach.

A graduate of Gordon College, where he was a three-year starter on the men's soccer team, Keehlwetter owns master's degrees from Duquesne and Gordon-Conwell Theological Seminary. He earned his doctorate from Fuller Theological Seminary and lives in Mercer with his wife, Lois. They have three adult children.

# 2006 SEASON PREVIEW

With only six upperclassmen on the roster, one might think that the Grove City College women's soccer team would be inexperienced entering the 2006 season. Nothing could be further from the truth.

Grove City returns nine starters from last year's squad that advanced to the Presidents' Athletic Conference championship match for the sixth consecutive season.

The Wolverines return five players who saw significant action at midfield, along with three starting defenders and a pair of veteran goalkeepers.

Seniors Lindsay Bowman, Maia Siber and Jessica Van Sickel are all returning starters. Bowman moved from forward to defender early in the 2005 season and helped solidify the Wolverine defense in her first year as a full-time starter.

Siber has been a fixture at midfielder since earning a starting spot midway through her freshman season. She finished third on the team with five goals last year.

Van Sickel is a two-year starter at defender for Grove City. She has 36 career starts to her credit and has helped Grove City post 15 shutouts over the past two seasons.

The Wolverines will also rely on a trio of juniors in 2006. Midfielders Alix Flowers and Bethany Peck both became full-time starters in 2005 after serving as part-time starters as freshmen.

Junior Bethany Smith has appeared in 32 matches during her first two years at Grove City. She is looking to break into the starting lineup up front this season.

The Wolverines also welcome back six sophomores who played extensively as freshmen last season. Midfielder Laura Shipley earned Second Team All-PAC honors after starting all 21 matches in 2005. She tied with Siber for third on the team with 11 total points.

Sophomores Anne Koller and Katie Wolff also return after solid freshman seasons at midfield. Koller made 14 starts in 2005 and scored a pair of goals. Wolff, meanwhile, played in 20 matches as a freshman. She made two starts.

Also back is sophomore defender Sara Griffin. Griffin made 15 starts during 2005 and will again be an integral part of Grove City's defense.

Junior Trisha Griffith and sophomores Kara Beevers and Rebecca Hurley all saw significant time as reserves in 2005 and will compete for starting positions this year.

In goal, sophomores Diana Prigel and Bethany Preston are both back after playing extensively as freshmen. Prigel started six matches before being sidelined for the season by injury. Preston recorded 127 saves and limited opponents to a 1.53 goals-against average in 17 total appearances.

Grove City opens the 2006 season Sept. 1 at home against Medaille. Five of the Wolverines' first six matches are at College Field this year. In addition to the PAC schedule, Grove City will also face regional foes Allegheny, Baldwin-Wallace, Carnegie Mellon and Muskingum in non-conference play this year.

# 2005 IN REVIEW

The final destination remained the same for the Grove City College women's soccer team in 2005. However, the journey to that destination featured more twists, turns and obstacles than in previous years.

Ultimately, the young Wolverines overcame those hurdles and advanced to the Presidents' Athletic Conference Championship Tournament finals for the sixth consecutive season.

Grove City opened the 2005 season with six consecutive home matches, including dates with regional powers Wilmington, Otterbein and Carnegie Mellon during the first week of the season.

With numerous freshmen dotting the lineup, Grove City went 0-3 during that first week of matches. But the experiences of that rugged stretch paid immediate dividends for the Wolverines in their PAC opener against Thomas More Sept. 10.

Grove City opened conference play by pulling out a 2-1 victory over the Saints at College Field. Sophomore Bethany Peck gave Grove City a 1-0 lead in the 36th minute while senior Stacey Brubaker scored the eventual game-winner at 58:55. Freshman Laura Shipley assisted on both goals.

The homestand closed with 2-1 setbacks against John Carroll and Mount Union. Senior Katie Klingensmith scored Grove City's lone goal in both matches.

The Wolverines then returned to PAC play Sept. 28 at archrival Westminster. Grove City blanked the Lady Titans for 88 minutes but Westminster's Abby Montgomery broke a scoreless tie with just two minutes left in regulation, giving Westminster a 1-0 win. Freshman goalkeeper Bethany Preston stopped a season-high 18 shots for Grove City.

Two days later, Grove City improved to 2-1 in the PAC with a 3-1 win at Waynesburg. Klingensmith scored twice while Shipley added an unassisted goal to help seal the victory. Preston earned the win in goal, her first collegiate victory.

Grove City split its next three PAC matches, going 1-1 over an 8-day span. Grove City out-shot host Bethany, 23-8, Oct. 5, but the Wolverines could not hold on to an early 1-0 lead and fell, 2-1.

However, the Wolverines rebounded quickly with an 8-0 home victory over Thiel the following afternoon.

Seven different players scored goals in the win. Brubaker scored twice while Klingensmith and Peck each had a goal and an assist. Freshman Katie Wolff opened the scoring just six minutes into the match with her first collegiate goal.

The Wolverines then earned a 1-1 draw at Washington and Jefferson Oct. 11. Senior defender Kristin Hummel gave Grove City a 1-0 first-half lead by scoring off Maia Siber's corner kick. The deadlock moved Grove City's PAC record to 3-2-1 at the midpoint of the conference schedule.

Following a home setback against Westminster, Grove City went undefeated over its next four conference matches.

The Wolverines began their run Oct. 18 with a 2-0 home win over Waynesburg. Freshman Anne Koller gave Grove City the lead in the first half with her first collegiate goal while Siber added an insurance goal in the second half. Preston picked up her second shutout win of the season.

Two days later, Klingensmith contributed to all five goals in the Wolverines' 5-1 victory over visiting Bethany. Klingensmith scored a pair of goals and assisted on the other three Grove City scores.

Grove City moved closer to securing a berth in the season-ending PAC Championship Tournament Oct. 22 by battling host Thomas More to a 0-0, double-overtime draw.

Preston stopped 11 shots in goal to preserve her third shutout of the season.

The Wolverines secured their second straight shutout at Thiel Oct. 25, earning a 3-0 victory at Alumni Stadium. Siber and Klingensmith each scored in the first half while Koller scored on a penalty kick in the second half.

During the final week of the regular season, Grove City fell to Penn State Behrend and Washington &

Jefferson. Still, Grove City qualified for the PAC Tournament as the fourth seed.

Grove City faced top seed Westminster in the semifinals Nov. 1 in rain-soaked New Wilmington. An unassisted goal by Shipley in the 34th minute gave the Wolverines a 1-0 halftime lead. Westminster tied the match less than three minutes into the second half.

Grove City blanked the Lady Titans over the final 43 minutes, however, forcing overtime. Neither team scored in 20 minutes of overtime, sending the match into a shootout.

The Wolverines fell behind in the shootout, 2-1, but Siber and junior Lindsay Bowman each scored on penalty kicks. Preston, meanwhile, posted back-to-back saves in goal.

Hummel then blasted her attempt past Westminster goalkeeper Whitney Griffith, clinching the shootout win and sending Grove City into the PAC title match.

Grove City's title hopes came to an end in the conference finals Nov. 6, however, as host Thomas More earned a 2-0 win over the Wolverines.

Hummel and Klingensmith each earned First Team All-PAC honors following the season while Brubaker and Shipley were Second Team selections.

Alix Flowers, Hummel and Klingensmith all earned Academic All-District College Division Third Team recognition from ESPN The Magazine and the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) after the season.

# THE PRESIDENTS' ATHLETIC CONFERENCE

Founded in 1955, the Presidents' Athletic Conference continues its mission of promoting intercollegiate athletics and the pursuit of academic excellence.

Comprised of 10 select private colleges - Bethany College, Chatham College, Geneva College, Grove City College, Saint Vincent College, Thiel College, Thomas More College, Washington and Jefferson College, Waynesburg College and Westminster College - the PAC remains a unique organization in this day of high pressure intercollegiate athletics.

Geneva and Saint Vincent are currently in the process of becoming full NCAA Division III members. Saint Vincent will play a full PAC schedule in all sports during the 2006-07 year while Geneva and Chatham will begin playing complete PAC schedules in 2007-08.

With academics at the center of each member's philosophy, the PAC is built on the principle that an athletic program is a part of college life, but not an entity in itself. The PAC annually crowns champions in 19 sports. All-Conference status is awarded in all 19 sports. Head

coaches select all-league squads for all team sports, while in individual sports such as cross country and tennis, all-PAC accolades are based upon performances at the conference championships.

The PAC annually awards its men's and women's All-Sports Trophies to the schools which perform best across the board in conference competition.

Washington & Jefferson won both the men's and women's All-Sports Trophies during the 2005-06 academic year.

True to its mission, the PAC has produced numerous CoSIDA Academic All-Americans as well as NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship winners. Grove City led all PAC schools with three CoSIDA Academic All-Americans during the 2005-2006 year.

In 2005-2006, the league named 428 student-athletes to the PAC Academic Honor Roll, which recognizes all participating student-athletes who attain a term grade-point average of 3.60 or above. Grove City led all conference schools with 84 total selections.

# ABOUT GROVE CITY COLLEGE

The beautifully landscaped campus of Grove City College stretches over 150 acres and includes 27 neo-Gothic buildings. It is considered one of the loveliest in the nation.

While the College has changed to meet the needs of the society it serves, its basic philosophy has remained unchanged since its founding in 1876. It is a Christian, liberal arts institution, dedicated to the principle of providing the highest quality education at the lowest possible cost.

Grove City College offers undergraduate degrees in liberal arts, sciences, engineering, business, and music and is distinguished as a national leader in education.

Grove City's programs in electrical and mechanical engineering are accredited by the Engineering Accreditation Commission Board of the Accreditation Board for Engineering and Technology.

The "big business school curriculum" prepares students for today's global business reality. An extensive variety of internship opportunities are provided across the curriculum.

Grove City College wants its students to be prepared in this age of mobile information technology.

Each entering freshman receives a color notebook computer which is his or hers to keep upon graduation with a four-year degree.

Grove City follows the semester calendar plan, in addition to offering two-week intersessions in January and May.

Most of the 2,400 students live in separate men's and women's dormitories. The rest are local commuters or married students. A full program of cultural, professional, athletic and social activities is offered, including 19 intercollegiate varsity athletic teams.

Grove City, a town of 8,100 people, is located 60 miles north of Pittsburgh. It is located near Interstates 79 and 80 and has a municipal airport.

# FACILITIES

All 19 of Grove City College's intercollegiate varsity athletic teams utilize the College's superior facilities for competition, practices and off-season training and conditioning.

Grove City's athletic facilities have undergone numerous renovations and improvements in recent years, with more upgrades scheduled in the immediate future.

On lower campus, Robert E. Thorn Field is home to the College's football and track and field teams. During the summer of 2006, the College installed CSTurf at Robert E. Thorn Field. CSTurf is a synthetic playing surface that features polyethylene LSR grass fibers and a rubber infill system.

Lights were also added at Robert E. Thorn Field while the 8-lane track around the field was resurfaced.

These upgrades benefit the entire campus community as the complex will now be used by both the College's club sports teams and its intramural program, along with the varsity teams.

The track is also available for use by recreational walkers and joggers. The complex also features 10 all-weather tennis courts next to the stadium.

Phillips Field House, located at the north end of the complex, features several locker rooms, an athletic training room, meeting rooms and coaches' offices.

It is used by the football, track and tennis programs throughout the academic year. Several upgrades to the facility were recently made.

The Physical Learning Center (PLC) houses the Grove City College Arena, home to the College's basketball and volleyball programs.

The 1,800-seat Arena received new scoreboards, new scorer's tables and new shotclocks during the 2004-05 academic year.

In addition, the PLC features the Grove City College Pool, one of the premier aquatic facilities in the region.

Each year, Grove City hosts the Presidents' Athletic Conference Swimming and Diving Championships at the state-of-the-art facility.

The PLC also features a second pool, the Recreational Pool, which is used by members of the College community year-round.

A fitness room featuring aerobic, Cybex and free weight equipment is an integral part of the PLC. Expansion of the fitness room is a keystone of the Center's ongoing renovations.

The PLC also features six racquetball/handball courts as well as two adjacent intramural rooms. The intramural rooms each feature four basketball courts, four indoor tennis courts, four volleyball courts, an indoor track and two indoor jumping pits.

The building houses an athletic training room, locker rooms and offices for coaches and physical education faculty. In 2004, the College constructed a new office suite for coaches and athletic administration.

Grove City's outdoor athletic facilities have also received numerous upgrades. The varsity soccer field, College Field, was expanded and re-sodded during the summer of 2005.
